DONATION RECIPIENT: FACETS FAIRFAX

On June 22, the Fairfax Area Christian Emergency Transition Services (FACETS) Board of Directors invited NOVEC Hands Engaged in Local Public Service (HELPS) members to an evening celebrating its 35 years of service to Fairfax County. FACETS works collaboratively with more than 35 faith communities and thousands of volunteers to expand safe, affordable housing and address all areas of hunger, homelessness, and poverty.

During the last two weeks of July, NOVEC HELPS held a school supply drive collecting donations from all NOVEC locations for FACETS. Through these generous donations, NOVEC HELPS provided ten 17-gallon tubs filled with school supplies.

In 2023, FACETS helped more than 4,000 people across all of its programs. This included providing over 1,000 people with safe, stable housing,

preventing more than 150 evictions, and serving more than 49,000 meals. These programs are made possible by the commitment of 5,300 volunteers.

FACETS will hold a Thanksgiving food drive in November collecting nonperishable food items and grocery store gift cards. Using those items, FACETS will create bundles for recipients, with everything needed for a Thanksgiving meal. In December, the organization will hold a Holiday Gift Drive, collecting gifts for children of all ages to local local shelters and community centers.
